

THE LESSON Acts 5:27-32

Lector A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

But Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than men. The God of our fathers raised Jesus whom you killed by hanging him on a tree. And we are witnesses to these things, and so is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

THE GOSPEL John 20:19-31

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being shut where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." Now Thomas, one of the twelve, called the Twin, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe." Eight days later, his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. The doors were shut, but Jesus came and stood among them, and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side; do not be faithless, but believing." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in his name.

Celebrant

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

Divine Mercy



On the Second Sunday of Easter, many Christians around the world observe "Divine Mercy Sunday," a feast celebrating the mercy and compassion of God that we receive in Christ Jesus.

While not formally a part of the Episcopal Church calendar, the themes of Divine Mercy Sunday fit perfectly with the message we find in today's Gospel reading (John 20:19-31).

At the heart of the Easter message and the events immediately following the discovery of the empty tomb is the compassion and mercy which flow from Jesus. His first words to the Apostles after His resurrection were "Peace be with you." With this greeting He also delegated pastoral authority to them saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (vv. 22-23). This profoundly powerful moment underpins God's desire for reconciliation with His creation, for our healing, and to equip us to share His love to the ends of the earth.

The tradition of Divine Mercy Sunday is rooted in the visions of St. Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun and mystic of the early 20th century. It is said that Faustina received a vision from our Lord where He called upon her to convey a message of God's boundless mercy; to call her community and the world to trust in His compassion and to show mercy to others.

In the original image of Divine Mercy, our Risen Savior has pale and red rays streaming from His side with the subtitle "Jesus I trust in you" inscribed at the bottom. The rays symbolize the Blood and Water that flowed from His side while He was on the cross. But, in His appearance to Faustina, they had been transformed into glorious rays, revealing a fount of healing graces for sinners who turn to Him with trust. The accompanying image above, by the Spanish artist Jose Luis Castrillo, presents a striking version where the rays emerge from a consecrated Host, reminding us of the deep connection between the Holy Eucharist and the mercy of Christ.

In the year 2000, Pope John Paul II confirmed the visions and writings of St. Faustina calling her "the great apostle of Divine Mercy in our time."

As Episcopalians we are invited to contemplate the power of the Resurrection during Eastertide; the forgiveness of sins, and the call to live as people of grace. As our Gospel reading reminds us, God's mercy is not only something we receive as a divine gift, but also something we are called to share.



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
